

4. CMOC-NORTHPARKES MINES UPDATE

Stacey Kelly introduced new CMOC NorthParkes Managing Director, Mr Jianjun Tian. Jianjun provided an overview of his background before coming to Northparkes.

Chris Higgins provided an update on Modification 6 to our current Project Approval. Key slides from the presentation below. The full presentation is at the end of these minutes.








Slide 8 - Stacey Kelly provided an update on the changes to the organisation structure, there is no Finance Director role, it is now a Finance Manager and Supply Chain Manager. NPM has reintroduced the Ore Processing Manager role which Mitch Garside is acting in. Also, since our last meeting we have a new Life of Mine Manager Cameron Schubert.




Slide 9 - Overview of the 2021 Value Chain.

Slide 11 - E26L1N

Stacey provided an update on the finalisation of the E26 L1N Project. Stacey confirmed there were 10-15 personnel who finished up at Northparkes due to their contract completion. Up to 90 personnel were redeployed across the business.

Stacey and Jianjun spoke to the map of Northparkes and provided summary, and also discussed and talked to upcoming projects such as the E22, E31's, Tailings Lifts.

The new E26 will provide an additional 8-9 years of operation. E22 will be our next major ore body.

Chris Higgins presented the following Approvals, Environment and Farms updates:

4.2 Approvals Status

E31 Open Pits Update

Pre-stripping is likely to commence in the second half of 2022 for commencement in 2023.



Slide 13 / 14 – E44 Rocklands and Modification 6

Chris stated that the E44 project is delayed as work concentrates on other projects closer to site. The feasibility study for E44 is still ongoing and as it's a satellite pit there are a range of additional costs, and the recent price of diesel may be a new one.

Q - Steve – Is the margin that tight that the diesel pricing would impact the project? **A - Stacey** – Inputs into the project including labour and diesel costs can decrease the profit margin considerably.





Slide 16 and Slide 17 – Farm trials were discussed and there were no recordable incidents for 2021 and YTD




Slide 18 and Slide 19 – Dust monitoring,: Chris advised NPM was compliant with all dust monitoring limits through the period. There was a dust event in May 2021 where a spike in dust at the Hubberstone monitor was generated from TSF1, this was the closest compliance near miss for a long time. Additional controls around prevention of dust have been implemented, focusing on increasing tailings roughness by ripping.







Slide 21 - Changes in 2021

Q - David - are the Pine Donkey Orchids endangered?

A - Chris - stated in the meeting that they are believed to be a threatened species, however they are listed as vulnerable.

Q - Marg - Where does NPM rate compared to other operations (in terms of environmental management) and what is the baseline?



A - Chris - there are 2 types of audits that were carried out in 2021. The two graphs on the left refer to the international ISO14001 Standard. The ISO14001 standard is able to be used for any company, not just mining, so it's hard to compare. NPM very much focus on continual improvement and don't compare ourselves to other operations. In saying that, we think we are doing well, however this year is our recertification year so the 2022 results will be an important check in on how we are going. The second audit type, the graph on the right, relates to regulatory conditions. It is possible that the Dept of Planning could compare NPM to other NSW mines as most conditions are pretty comparable, but they don't let us know how we are going and we don't compare.

A – Stacey - It is rare for a mining organisation to go 2 years without any reportable environmental incidents or community complaints.



Slide 24 – Kokoda Biodiversity offset

Q - Steve - asked what our Indigenous employee levels are at the moment?

A – Stacey – currently we are sitting at around 4 to 5%. With the Kokoda project NPM employed 2 groups through Skillset that were trained and received a certificate. They have now gone on to other employment opportunities. Also, in 2021 we completed Cultural Heritage work with 20 Aboriginal people across the Parkes and Peak Hill Community. This provided an opportunity for the Aboriginal community to do their first field surveys and identify artefacts with a group of respected elders across the Parkes and Peak Hill communities.

We are looking at ways and diversity targets at Northparkes to improve stats.

Q - Steve - Does NPM have an Indigenous Employment Strategy?

A - Stacey - Not at the moment but we are looking at reviewing our inclusion and diversity metrics, we want our workforce to reflect our community.


Q - Bill - Employment levels - are you finding it hard to fill vacancies? is there shortages?

A - Stacey - We are not finding it difficult to fill vacancies at the moment as we had additional staff available with the projects finishing.

We are also finding there are childcare availability issues for Parkes and Peak Hill which is challenging for working families.

Slide 29 – Community and External relations

Gabe provided an update on the community and external relations strategy for 2022.

- We will continue to support Parkes Shire Council with Sports Grants, APO and Grants Officer
- The CIP program has opened for H1 and will close end of April
- The Indigenous scholarships have been awarded and the SMMO and Triple Flag scholarships will be awarded over the next two weeks



- The new town office is up and running it is located across from the Parkes Police Station the old Post Office Building, we have the top floor which has 8 hot desks, a meeting room and office and the downstairs office is where the Community and Eternal relations team is based.
- Northparkes is providing funding for the Coordinator of Project Sprouts which is a non profit organisation screening children between 3 and 5 before commencing school on key health and educational services.
- Triple Flag will be in Parkes on Monday 4th / Tuesday 5th April for a site visit and meeting with councils
- We have been focusing on community and improved social engagement and are seeing increased interaction across our social media platforms
- Frontline Ball Northparkes will be funding a Frontline Ball in July to provide fundraising for the emergency services in our local community.

6. GENERAL BUSINESS

Q: Steve – There is much talk about rehabilitation of mined land; will it be possible to put the land back to the way we found it when the mine closes?

A - Stacey – as part of out Rehabilitation Management Plan we have commitments around the closure and rehab of the land; most approvals require rehabilitation plans. There is money held in bonds and around biodiversity offsets. Mine closure will require on-going monitoring, including safety and security of voids etc.

Chris has recently been accepted at the University of Queensland to complete his Masters in Rehabilitation

A - Chris – We have commitments to final land uses after mining, however the mine site will not be exactly the same as it was prior to mining. But we are committed to rehabilitation.
